## **DECEMBER 2004 COUNCIL COMMENTS**

Eleven council members attended the December 14, 2004 meeting. Pastor Stan led the meditation and prayer.

The minutes of the November 9, 2004 meeting were approved as presented.

Pastor Combs' Report: Pastor Stan recommended for full membership: Last Month: Charles and Ruth Fishel, Gregory and Linda Grim, Jamie Pickel, Don and Jeri Pickel.

This month: Lloyd A. Kornbur, Peter and Judy Vasali and son. Council approved this motion. Pastor Stan reported with the above, new members will total 100 for 2004.

Pastor Jorgensen's Report: Reported six members expressed an interest in taking the Stephen Ministry training. Pastor Janyce reported Bishop Hendrix would be visiting the York Conference February 8

Administrator Dye's Report: Reported carpet has been installed in the Youth Room. A motion was made and seconded to secure and establish the services of Latsha, Davis, Yohe and McKenna PC of Mechanicsburg as legal counsel. Council approved this motion. The job description for Volunteer Coordinator, developed by the Task Force, was distributed and will be discussed at the January Council meeting. The Draft Youth Room policy was distributed and will be discussed at the January Council meeting. Joyful Noise Pre-school Committee reported Nancy Stavrakakis will replace Kelly Christmas who is resigning December 31, 2004. Zion received three staff resignations on December 2, 2004: Suzanne Tilley (verbal, effective immediately), Richard Suitner, Jr. (written

effective 12/2/2004) and Randy Miller (e-mail, effective 12/2/2004). Gerald Mummert has been retained as interim organist and choir director starting January 2, 2005 through Easter, 2005.

Treasurer's Report: November was a good month. The year-end projection is that we will end up close to break-even (actual). A motion was made and seconded to contribute \$500 each to the York Conference Tutoring program and the York County Council of Churches. Council approved this motion. Motion was made and seconded to accept the Treasurer's report as presented. Council approved.

Investment Treasurer's Report: Reported our Merrill Lynch account is earning less than one percent. A motion was made and seconded to transfer Zion's funds to Smith Barney to take advantage of better interest rates of 2.4% to 3.15%. Council approved this motion.

## COMMITTEE REPORTS

Stewardship: Reported articles will be in the January Herald and on Zion's website promoting our need for members to complete "Sharing and Growing Our Gifts" surveys.

Christian Education and Youth: The plans for the Christmas play are in progress

Worship and Music: Reported approximately 270 persons are participating in the activities of the church such as ushers, greeters, acolytes, lay readers, communion assistants and the musical organization. Parish Health Sue Luchka resigned as Parish Health Committee chair. Connie Pearl is the new committee chair.

Outreach: The information booth is completed and the committee would like to thank Ron Reinecker for a job well done.

Property: Reported base molding and chalkboard were installed in Youth Room and wall panels were attached in the storage shed.

New Business: It was announced the Synod is providing leadership training on February 26, 2004 at Trinity Lutheran, Camp Hill. Thanks was expressed to Christine Dye, Denise Moyer, Dave Portner and Rita Ware for their years of service as members of Zion's Congregational Council.

The Council meeting ended by praying the Lord's Prayer in the Oberdick Circle.

discussed, most of the expenses are evenly split throughout the year even though our giving is quite seasonal. As you can see, our Giving has increased recently through the congregation's generosity, which has been greatly needed.

The giving for November was over \$8,000 higher than required but still leaves us almost \$47,000 below our requirement for the year to date. These amounts exclude designated giving.

Fortunately, we have been prudent in our expense spending this year which has helped reduce our deficit. Thus far, we have spent \$14,547 less than budgeted expenses.

I would like to thank the entire congregation for their support and prayers and hope everyone has a joyous and safe holiday season.

The following article is taken from a Parish Health Newsletter. Although it talks about depression in the older adult PLEASE be aware that everyone can be at risk for depression as a chronic disorder.

Not Just 'Seasonal Affective Disorder': In Older Adults  
Depression Can Be A Chronic Disease

Every year, the holiday season brings out stories about lonely, depressed older adults. Though many of us see depression as a seasonal or transient mood change, for many people ages 60 and older, depression, depressive symptoms, and anxiety are a year-round chronic and debilitating illness.

Older adults do not fit snugly into clinical profiles of people affected by depression and anxiety, yet depressive symptoms and behaviors that identify anxiety

are seen in 19 percent of community-dwelling people ages 60 and older. Unfortunately, even if older adults recognize these feelings and even if low-cost treatment is readily accessible, the stigma of mental illness inhibits many elders from seeking help.

80% of older adults treated for an episode of depression successfully recover. However, depression in late life tends to recur. New encounters or even continuing environmental conditions may trigger depression or contribute to anxiety disorders. Campaigns to stem the environmental conditions that bring on depressive symptoms and that improve opportunities for healthy living have anecdotally improved the mental wellbeing of older adults. For example over and over, aerobic exercise has been shown to decrease depressive symptoms. It may provide a buffer for nondepressed older adults, keeping their mood elevated so that the stressors of later life do not trigger depression or anxiety. In addition, with training may have antidepressant properties and has been reported to improve sleep quality.

Poor nutrition in and of itself does not cause depression but can play an important role in affecting its onset and length. The debate continues on the specifics of nutrition and mental wellness. Yet we know that within the brain, poor nutrition can cause impairment of blood circulation, which is important in supplying neurons (brain cells) with the building materials they require for proper function. In 2002, the University of North Carolina Student Health Services showed that skipping meals and eating sweets, coupled with poor appetite or inability to purchase healthy foods, can be associated with depression. The financial constraints of a fixed income may force older adults to eat foods of poor nutritional value.

Other barriers to mental wellness involves misuse of alcohol and medications, side effects of medications, sleep disturbances, and the emotional impact of living with one or more chronic illnesses such as heart disease, stroke, cancer, Parkinson's disease, arthritis and chronic pain.

Researchers looking for ways to promote "successful" or "vital" aging agree that enhancing mental wellness and preventing depressive symptoms are keys to ensuring an active, engaged old age. Their suggested prescriptions for mental wellness include exercise, healthy eating, stress reduction, laughter and humor, optimism, sleep, emotionally enriched environments, and purposeful living.

## **Raise Up the Church! Drive Down the Debt!**

As of November 31, 2004, Zion Lutheran Church's financial deficit is

# **\$53,171**

As of Oct. 31, 2004, Zion Lutheran Church continues to be in a deficit situation. Here is how it breaks down:

Current Offering	\$16,604 lower than budget
Debt Reduction	\$15,834 lower than budget

Add to that the remaining percentage of the yearly deficit that was approved. For 2004, the

Benevolence	\$17,524 lower than budget
TOTAL	\$49,962

approved deficit was \$38,500. Since there is two months remaining in the year, we still need 1/12th of \$38,500 which equals \$3,209. This totals \$53,171.

### Why Has This Happened?

Our committees and staff have done a great job in keeping our expenses within their budgeted amounts all year. Quite simply, the offerings have not kept pace to cover all of our expenses. To clear this deficit and to start 2005 off right, we all need to act now

### What Can I Do?

- 1) Increase your offerings by \$5.00 - \$10.00 per week.
- 2) Sign up for Simply Giving, our automated offering program offered for free by Thrivent Financial for Lutherans (brochures are located at the Information Booth).
- 3) Prayfully consider increasing your offerings by another percentage of your income.
- 4) Think about what ministries Zion might not be able to offer next year if the deficit isn't cleared.
