This past fall, I had the opportunity to take a continuing education class at Princeton Theological Seminary under the capable teaching of Fleming Rutledge. Fleming is a delightful person filled with southern wit and charm. In her book, *The Undoing of Death*, she tells about a time she was in a church bookstore looking for Easter cards. A young woman came in with a friend. This young woman was apparently a teacher's aide for a church school. She was complaining to her friend that she had been called in by the head teacher, who disapproved of the way she was telling the Easter story to the children. She was told that she absolutely could not mention the fact that Jesus had died, because it would upset the children. The clerk behind the counter said she wasn't so sure about that; she had taught Sunday School, she recalled, and the children didn't see to be upset, just curious. She wisely added, "This worry about mentioning death is a grown-up concern, not a child's."

Have you ever taken the time to study Easter cards? I have yet to see one which actually mentions death. You can find beautiful Christian Easter cards with crosses on them and the words, "Christ is Risen," but I doubt you will find any that say anything about death. In fact, I once read that the people who compose the sentimental messages for Hallmark cards are specifically instructed that the word "death" should never, ever appear -- not even on sympathy cards.

I think we all know what is behind it. Avoidance and denial are typical human responses to unpleasant situations. We may personally honestly believe if you don't talk about it, it won't happen. Out of sight, out of mind.

That's what makes our Lord's Passion so amazing. It was the ultimate example of non-avoidance. He went straight into his suffering, straight to his betrayal, straight to the scourging and mocking, straight to his crucifixion and death. Instead of avoiding the unpleasant, the painful, the difficult, he faced it where it presented itself.

How reassuring this is for we who follow Christ! Throughout life we will also experience our share of the unpleasant, the painful, the difficult. What we learn from Christ is that avoidance and denial will not make any of it go away, but through the grace and power unleashed Christ's victorious resurrection we are able to do things that we thought we never could do. We are not only able to cope and endure, but prevail!

And that friends is why during this month's Holy Week we will talk about death, we will talk about suffering, we will talk about the unpleasant. Such things are very real and are not meant to be avoided. But we will also talk of victory and life! For in Christ these things are not only real they are our future!

Our Holy Week services begin on March 19 and 20 with our Palm Sunday services as we recall our Lord's triumphant entry into Jerusalem and His eventual death. It continues on Maundy Thursday with 7:00 p.m. service of Holy Communion and the solemn stripping of the altar. The next night we will gather once again at 7:00 p.m. for our first ever Good Friday Tenebrae service as we ponder the great mystery of the cross. And our Holy Week journey concludes on March 26 and 27 with our joyful services of Easter Resurrection and victory.

This year, make a commitment to yourself to attend all of the Holy Week services. Whatever you do, don't just skip to Easter -- don't avoid the pain and the unpleasantness of Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday and Good Friday, for to do that is to miss the full joy of our Lord's glorious resurrection.

The goodness of His gospel love, the thanksgiving of how He suffered to help us to live more abundantly, and the joyful promise of His resurrection live in your heart at Easter and always.

### February 2005 Council Comments

Ten council members, both pastors and Patrick Dye attended the February 8, 2005 meeting. The meeting was held early at 6:00pm and was abbreviated to allow all members to attend Bishop Hendrix's "Church Hall Meeting" at St. Mathew's at 7:00 PM. Zion was very well represented at an interesting and informative meeting. It was the first meeting with the Bishop for many.

Jennifer Lau led the opening meditation.

The minutes of the January 11, 2005 Council meeting were approved.

Pastor Stan reported that attendance in January averaged 392 each week during January. Pastor Stan recommended for full membership: Last Month: Frank and Kathleen Schneider. This month: Jeff and Tracey Oberdorf, children: Jacquelyn & Lauren, Chris and Kris Keller, children: Claudia, Trevor & Dylan, Michael and Susan Baker, and Gayle Brass. All were approved for membership.

Pastor Janeyce requested for two delegates to attend the annual conference in Gettysburg, June 9, 10 and 11. Sharon Stites agreed to attend. The second delegate will be determined at the March 8 meeting. Pastor Janeyce has been busy with Stephen Ministry interviews and plans for additional pastoral coverage during Pastor Stan's upcoming Sabbatical.

The Treasurer's report was received and accepted.

### Committee Reports

The Finance Committee reported that they are still looking for volunteers to count the offerings on Sundays. They also recommended that the Zion checking account be moved from to the Commerce Bank to be more cost effective. This was approved by Council.

Worship and Music reported that Jerry Mummert would play the organ for most of the mid-day Lenten Services and Jack Mecker would play the piano for the evening services. Their participation and talents are greatly appreciated. It was also reported that Laura Myers has offered to re-organize the JEMS music schedule for the remainder of the year.

Audio/Visual recommended the approval of a new audio wiring system (a "snake") to improve and minimize the tangle of wires, etc. in the sanctuary. Their revised recommendation was for less money than budgeted and was approved. Council also approved the purchase of a new computer for \$325 to replace one that "crashed" recently.

The recommendations from the Long Range Planning Committee regard task groups were tabled until the March meeting.

A recommendation from the Personnel Committee to carry over unused vacation days was approved. This practice will apply to the Pastors and must be used up by March 31 of each year.

### New Business

Council confirmed the appointments of Mary Dart and Phil Reichard as chairpersons of Christian Education Committee and Property Committee; respectively. Council also approved the one time appointment of Past President Lucille Demyanovich to the Council Executive Committee. The appointee is to serve in an advisory capacity for one year; non-voting.

The Council Meeting ended at 6:50 PM by praying the Lord's Prayer in the Oberdick Circle.

How are Mission Investment Funds used?

### Purchase of church sites and parsonages, Construction of new church buildings, Repair and renovation of church facilities

What investment options are available?

- Mission Term** -- this is an investment made for a period of one, three, or five years. The minimum investment is \$100. Interest is paid every six months from the date of the investment. Your interest check may be sent to you or automatically reinvested.
- Mission Plus** -- This is an investment similar to a money market account with a minimum initial investment of \$1000, you will be issued a Mission Plus checkbook. You may write checks for a minimum of \$500 for redemption from the account. Additions of at least \$100 may be made at any time.
- Mission IRA** -- This is an opportunity to invest in Mission Term investments while enjoying the tax deferred benefits of an IRA. The minimum initial investment is \$1000. There is no requirement for annual investment. You may annually invest the lesser of 100% of your income or \$2000.

What are the rates?

### YOUTH ACTIVITIES AT ZION!

Over the past few weeks I have had several people ask me what kind of youth and children's activities are available here at Zion. So, I am pleased to share all the activities available for all the youth in the Herald. In the near future, there will also be brochures showing the different activities offered that you will be able to take and share with their parents and neighbors too!

We offer the following activities for children between the ages of 3 through 6 grade:

- Saturday night children's church during the 5:30 p.m. service
- Sunday School during the 9:30 a.m. service
- Kid's Blast event once a month on the 2<sup>nd</sup> Saturday from 6:30 p.m. — 8:30 p.m.
- Easter Egg Hunt the Saturday before Easter (this year it is March 26)
- Vacation Bible School in the summer (this year it is 7/11 through 7/15)
- Elementary youth choir (practices are twice a month with performance once a month)
- Christmas caroling in December
- Camping opportunities at the Lutheran Camps Nawakwa & Kirchenwald with discounts offered by the church
- Boy Scout and Girl Scouts use our facilities here (we charter the boy scouts troop 150)
- Scout religious award training
- Acolyte Training for those entering 4th grade
- Children's sermons held during worship services
- First Holy Communion instruction during Lenten season
- JEM scholarships for musically inclined students
- Additional seasonal/holiday events

As for the Jr. and Sr. High youth, the following activities are offered:

- Sunday School for Sr. High at 8:30 in the youth room
- Jr. High Sunday School at 9:30
